- 1) Welcome: Introduction / Roll Call of Officers and Regional Directors (Amy Trang)
 - a) Opening remarks made by Richard So and Dr. Carol Brosgart
 - b) Members were asked to introduce themselves in the chat box
 - c) Recognize any new members on the call: see list of attendees above

- 3) Project Updates
 - a) HBV universal vaccination guidance promotion among providers
 - i) No new updates
 - b) HBV ECHO program expansion
 - Per Dr. Richard Andrew's suggestion in the last meeting, we're going to approach existing HCV ECHO programs and ask them to also include HBV and call it Viral Hepatitis ECHO so that we could leverage and maximize existing resources.
 - (1) Dr. Saira Kharderi and Dr. Howard Lee with the Texas (Gulf Coast) HBV ECHO Program agrees. The Gulf Coast HBV ECHO program has been going on for a year now and attendance and cases each month have fluctuated. Dr. Kharderi discussed with Dr. Gish, Dr. Andrews, and Dr. Chari Cohen on combining HBV/HCV efforts. That new effort will take place in the next few months.

- ii) Thaddeus shared that Hawaii's weekly HBV ECHO program has been working well. They've been getting weekly engagements and at least 1 case study each session. Hep B Free Hawaii also tracks and share viral hepatitis ECHO programs on their website: <u>https://www.hepfreehawaii.org/news/hep-b-mortality-in-hi-data</u>
- iii) Dr. Carol Brosgart commented that we will need more than ECHO to help with addressing universal screening and vaccination guidelines.
 - (1) We need to bring together all the relevant primary care organizations to help us send out the guidelines.
 - (2) We can also start with talking with our primary care providers at our annual check-ups.
 - (3) We can do "Grand rounds" at the hospitals.
 - (4) Amy agreed and commented that this would be a great time and opportunity to nominate and encourage new Task Force members from these organizations because we will have a lot of seats vacant with the upcoming term limits.
 - (a) We can also leverage existing resources from HCV and HIV programs to present HBV screening more comprehensively.
 - (b) Once the universal screening guidelines are finalized, Amy will create basic info PowerPoint slides and upload it to our website so anyone could use it for Grand Rounds; this would be similar to the H.E.L.P. training materials that we did in 2017 and 2018.
- c) HBV workforce development projects (Amy Trang)
 - i) No new updates
- d) HBV elimination plan best practices among state Viral Hepatitis Coordinators: no new updates

- e) HBV work group on updating screening guidance (Amy Trang)
 - i) Still waiting for the HBV universal screening guidelines from CDC are anticipated to be published; it's supposed to be this month.
 - ii) September 15, 2022: The Task Force in collaboration with Hepatitis B Foundation had the second "treatment expansion" workgroup meeting last Thursday; it's the second part of the 2-day (3 hour) meeting. There are about 40 individuals involved in this workgroup, including: Dr. Carol Brosgart, Dr. Robert Gish, Dr. Richard Andrews, Dr. Amy Tang, Dr. Jacki Chen, and Dr. Amy Trang.
 - (1) We anticipate having a White Paper published to share findings from our very engaging and productive meetings.
 - iii) Other support service explored:
 - (1) Warmline: Dr. Chris Bositis and Carolyn Chu joined the Hep B Task Force call for the first time.
 - (a) Members discussed different funding resources and opportunities (non-pharma)
 - (b) Richard So offered to look into some resources to share, such as Foundation grants, e.g., SF Can from UCSF.
 - (c) Dr. Carol Brosgart inquired if funding could come from commercial laboratory like Labcorp or Quest; Carolyn thinks that this could be explored as well as EHR companies
 - (i) Dr. Howard Lee sits on EPIC's advisory committee and could inquire with them; he's looking into the clinical pathway
 - 1. Amy asked about whether Dr. Lee had any updates on the automated reminders for HBV screening with EPIC; Dr. Lee shared that many primary care providers have provided feedback regarding the "fatigue" of getting so many different auto reminders so there's still ongoing discussion on how to best approach it.
